Scholarship Program

We want to let all of our families know about our up and coming scholarship program. The Board has approved this pilot program and the Tuition Assistance Committee and Finance Circle are hard at work to get everything in place in time for the 2010-2011 school year. While we have a well-established tuition assistance program, our financial awards are based on income and assets. We have found through the years that there are certain situations where tuition assistance is not sufficient to allow a family to attend the school. Sometimes, it's because a family's income is too high to qualify for tuition assistance, but they have unusual expenses. Sometimes, families cannot afford even the minimum tuition.

While our tuition assistance program is also designed to accommodate short-term, exceptional situations, such as the loss of a job or a debilitating illness, it has been a challenge to address some of the more long-term needs in a caring, yet objective way. We have therefore expanded our range of financial options by instituting a scholarship program. Families applying to receive a scholarship will be asked for financial information, but they will also be asked to submit written materials detailing their commitment to the school and to Waldorf education, and explaining their specific financial situation. We will also use supplemental information from the child's class teacher and the business office to complete the application packet.

It is important to stress that the funding for this program will, at least initially, come from the same funds that are now set aside for tuition assistance. Creation of the program has not brought in more financial support for the coming year for families in need; it will, instead, allow us to create a new process and unburden the Tuition Assistance Committee from doing work that has been outside the scope of their mandate. However, it is our deepest hope that with the creation of this program, we will be able to attract outside funds for the purpose of scholarship. We welcome donations for the scholarship program and anticipate some special types of offerings—such as grade specific scholarships. We are excited by the potential of this program to assist ever more families and to attract donors who wish to give specifically to enable more children to attend the Eugene Waldorf School.

The first step in applying for a scholarship will be to apply for tuition assistance. This year, we hope to inform all families of their tuition assistance awards in early May. At that point, families who have not received enough help through tuition assistance can begin the rest of the scholarship application process. All families, including new families and families who do not qualify for tuition assistance, are eligible to apply for scholarship. We expect to have the application materials ready for those wishing to apply by early April. They can be turned in after completing all the sections including the tuition assistance application.

We will be sharing more with the community in the coming weeks. Please feel free to contact Molly in the Business Office with any questions about this new and exciting program.
